Wally Cronshaw (6/7/33 - 23/10/95) Chairman of The Sale GF Society.

Wally went to Langworthy School, Salford and spent more time in the headmaster's office than he did in the classroom. At the age of eight his only relatives were, a mother, stepfather and a half brother. He left school at 14 years of age to train as a butcher. He met his future wife, Alice, at the age of 16.

He went into the national army service - Royal Signals, as a butcher/driver and always got the best jobs in exchange for the best cuts of meat.

He & Alice had 3 sons, Wally, Alan, and Steven. Also 4 grandchildren, Mark, Karen, Jenni and Ryan. He was very much a family man.

In 1968 they emigrated to Australia where he was very well thought of by his many friends. They returned in 1973 and eventually built up a business of 5 butchers shops. Wally was forced to retire in 1984 due to ill-health -

The Film, "No Limit" is 60 year old and still a firm favourite with the public. Especially on the Isle Of Man.

The film was made in 1935. The Producer was Basil Dean, and the Director was Monty Banks. The story was written by Arthur Greenwood, who wrote "Love On The Dole." The two main stars were George Formby and Florence Desmond. In



1986, there was a broadcast on the Manx radio on the making of the film. It was the first full length film ever to be made on the isle. Many of the locals gave their story.

The late Harold Rowell appeared on the radio show. He was one of the riders in the film and he gave talks on his experiences about the making of the film. Our thanks have gone to his widow for supplying a copy of his lecture sheets.

<u>Harold Rowell recalls:-</u> You may be disappointed that I can tell you very little of the non-motorcycling parts, but you see, when there was no filming to be done we all went back to our own jobs - remember the film was made during the peak weeks of the holiday season.

George Formby was the right man for the job, and, I believe that the film did more to further George's career than any other of his films. There is no doubt about the amount of good it has done for the Isle Of Man.

How did I become involved in this caper? Well it was needs must! The machine I had arranged to ride in the Manx Grand Prix turned out to be a complete flop in the T.T. and I urgently needed a goodly sum of money in order to buy a four year old Rudge. My financial position was, in fact, considerably worse than that of our hero in the film.

Then, out of the blue, here came, what appeared to be a golden opportunity. The late Ernie Vick, father of the island's present Surveyor General, introduced me to the director of a small film unit who was making a film on how the Post Office Telephones helped the T.T organisation. It was suggested that I dress up as a racer and spend the next few days flying round corners while they filmed me. The pay was

Then of course, I can't forget Anthony, he is like one of the family now and I know that Ashley loved him dearly.

Thank you all for being so caring and loving to Ashley. Thank you for his wonderful send off, there were lots of tears shed, and I'll bet that he and George were having a good laugh at us all - perhaps telling better jokes than Harry.

You haven't seen the last of me as I hope to carry on where Ashley left off and perhaps learn to play the ukulele. Love to all, Denise & Family."

And thank you Denise for being so brave to take the floor. The only consolation we can offer is that poor Ashley is no longer in pain. We sincerely hope that you and your family will have the strength to put the past three dreadful years behind you and get on with living your life. Dear Ashley will wish it that way. He will be sadly missed by all.

From Walter Arries...

I first met Beryl & George in the manager's office at the Newcastle Empire one Monday evening in 1938. It was about 6pm and Beryl was demanding the money up front before she would allow him to perform

The next time we met was at 107 Mill, an RAF Station on the Bitter Lake, Canal Zone, Egypt, where my unit leagued, after 2 years in the desert, on the way to Berlin.

I told George that while I was stationed at Gosport, in 1941, I had seen his film "It's In The Air" at a cinema, where my companion, a Land Army girl, and I were the total audience.

He never came to Burma, though Vera Lynn, Elsie & Doris Waters and an alcholic comic called Stainless Stephen did. He was crude and the Waters sisters had dysentery. Who didn't?

Man in restaurant: Waiter, this chicken has got one leg longer than the other. Waiter: Well, what are you going to do. Eat it, or dance with it? $\pounds 2.10.0$ ($\pounds 2.50$) per day. I was proud to have been selected until I found that they had tried all the good riders first.

This job terminated rather suddenly. 1935 was the last year of the old hump-backed Ballig Bridge and some of you may remember that it was extremely narrow. I practised quite a lot on hairy long jumps at Ballig and once we were satisfied, we stuck a piece of paper on the road to show my usual landing point. It was agreed that the cameraman would lie in the road about a foot to the side of the mark. When I arrived on the bridge for the actual shot to be taken I saw, to my horror, that he was actually lying on the paper. Fortunately I swerved one way and he rolled over to the other, just in time. I managed not to fall off but I hit the hedge and about £200 pounds worth of damage was done to the camera. I was sacked on the spot and sent back to financial gloom.

A few days later, brother Bertie, and I, received a call from a man called SZABO. He invited us to join a bunch of motorcyclists who were involved in the making of the film. Quite a few of them were members of the Peveril Club but as time went on they gradually drifted back to their regular jobs.

Part of the filming was done during the T.T. Race weeks and Monty Banks got permission to take shots of the crowded Grandstand. He ran up and down the road dressed in a canary coloured sweater, white plus fours, black and white chequered stockings and Rosemary shoes. The crowds were instructed to turn their heads like they do at Wimbledon and within a few minutes he had taken some wonderful crowd scenes - all for a small donation in the hospital box.

I must admit that the first day on the road, with the unit, shook me rigid. Our first location was supposed to be at the Quarter Bridge, and never have I seen so much confusion. Paddy Johnson and Jock Fairweather had arrived from the Falcon Cliff Hotel to tell Monty Banks that he couldn't hire, or borrow the T.T. New Imperial motorcycles for his stunt men. This caused chaos. Everybody was talking and nobody was listening and poor Monty was getting nowhere.

In the middle of the chaos someone decided that I was too slim so, in order to make me look bigger, and tougher, SZABO and Jack Blyth pushed sheets of felt inside my leathers and orange peel between my gums to make my face look fatter.

Monty decided that nothing was being achieved so we moved to Snugboro to make a few test shots. It was here that Jack Fairweather, Paddy Johnson and I dropped a man sized clanger. We were sitting on the hedge with a little bloke who was wearing an old fashioned brown leather suit. We told him about the lack of organisation and got round to asking him who the fool was that was starring in the film. "I am" - and that's how we met George Formby, bless him. CONTINUED NEXT MONTH


